SYMBOLS of the CHRISTMAS Season ADVENT WREATH: the round shape of the Advent Wreath reminds us of the unbroken love of God. The green branches speak of new life. The candles remind us of the light that came into the world with Jesus.

ANGEL: the word *angel* comes from a Greek word meaning *messenger*. Angels appeared to Mary & Joseph, bringing news that Mary would give birth to Jesus. Angels also appeared to the shepherds in the fields, announcing Jesus' birth.



BELLS: for centuries, bells in church steeples have announced special occasions and good news. Christmas bells remind us of the good news of Jesus' birth.

CANDY CANES: remind us of the staffs used by

shepherds, who were the first to hear the good news & visit the new Baby Jesus.

CHRISTMAS BALLS: balls have a round shape that

reminds us that God's love has no end. They also remind us of the

globe/world into which Jesus came as Emmanuel.



CHRISTMAS TREES: are evergreen, symbolizing everlasting life—the good news that Jesus' death & resurrection

proclaimed for all humanity. **CRECHE:** was first introduced by St. Francis of Assisi, around 1200 CE. St. Francis felt the people in his small village in Italy had lost sight of the real



STOCKINGS: the traditional story is that Nicholas, a 4^{th} cent. Bishop in



Turkey, secretly tossed some gold coins into the window of a needy family, which landed in stockings hung to dry in front of the fireplace. So we hang stockings today in the hope that the spirit of St.

Nicholas will visit our homes also.
