Craft Corner – Making Paper Heart Lilies:

Supplies needed: White construction paper, glue, scissors, and green pipe cleaners.

Cut a heart out of the paper. Keep the pointed end up. Fold one round over the other and glue them together. While the glue dries, take a pipe cleaner and tie a knot in it about 1 -2 inches from the end. Make a loop above the knot. When the flower heart is dry, pull the pipe cleaner through the heart until it sits on the knot. This will ensure that the flower holds its shape. Taken from www.themotherhuddle.com
